HYBRID COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a survey course to introduce students to the philosophical study of logic, epistemology, metaphysics, and religion. Topics will include deductive and inductive arguments, formal and informal fallacies, Plato's theory of knowledge as well as that of Descartes, Hume, Berkeley, and Kant. We will also briefly explore the concept of the individual in relation to society.

Please note that even though there is no prerequisite to enroll in this course, I strongly recommend the completion of English 1A prior to enrolling in this course. Successful completion of any philosophy course requires that you have good reading comprehension and writing skills.

This section is a hybrid section. We will meet 2 hours in-person on Tuesdays from 4:00pm – 5:50pm. You are also required to fulfill 2 additional hours of online activity using the Catalyst system at <https://catalyst.deanza.edu>. Please note that the online component requires students to have more self-discipline and motivation to fulfill the course requirements than traditional courses. For this reason, this course is not suitable for everyone.

Grading is based upon an in-depth understanding of the course material and the display of critical thinking and insight. Students achieving an A in this course come to class on a regular basis, do all of the assigned readings including supplemental readings, doing all of the assigned reflection papers, doing well on all exams, completing a well written term paper, and asking questions if you do not understand the material covered in this course. All of this requires that you have a great degree of academic discipline as well as self-discipline, mental maturity, and a relatively stable personal life. If you want to do well, then it is your responsibility to have all or most of these conditions met prior to enrollment in this course.

Your grade for this course is final and will not be changed unless under justifiable circumstances as described in the Academic Policy. It is not permissible to turn in late assignments or make up assignments to increase your final grade once grades are submitted. Your grade is not negotiable if it is the result of your own incompetence. Receiving letter grades of D or F means that you will have to retake this course for it to count towards your GE and/or transfer

requirements. Incompletes are only granted under severe circumstances that are beyond your control such as severe illness or death of a family member. Proper documentation is required when requesting an Incomplete.

ATTENDANCE, PARTICIPATION, AND ENROLLMENT

Students are expected to read the material, do homework assignments, attend class, and be prepared to engage in classroom discussion because these are crucial elements of the learning process. You cannot participate if you do not attend, therefore you must attend if you do not want to be penalized for this. Attendance will be taken on random days. If I pass out a roll sheet, it is your responsibility to make sure that your name is on the roll sheet by the end of the class session, otherwise you will lose points. **POOR ATTENDANCE WILL UNDERMINE YOUR FINAL GRADE BY A MAXIMUM OF 100 POINTS (OR 10%).**

This course also requires two hours of online activity each week, primarily in the form of online Forum discussions and group assignments. Students can fulfill this component at any time during the week.

If you decide to stop attending class for whatever reason, it is your responsibility to drop from the course by the withdrawal deadline. You may receive an F for the course if you fail to do this. I will not give anyone an **INCOMPLETE** grade unless under justifiable circumstances as described in the College Policy and Procedures. I may decide to drop students who are deemed inactive (those not attending or not doing homework assignments).

QUIZZES AND EXAMS (600 POINTS)

There are two exams, and each is worth 150 points for a grand total of 300 points. Each exam consists of short-response questions and/or at least one longer response question. There are also ten quizzes, and each is worth 30 points for a grand total of 300 points. Quizzes are held on a weekly basis (on Thursdays). The exams will be held during the middle and at the end of the term.

There are no make-up quizzes and exams unless you have a good excuse (e.g., being extremely ill, the death of a family member, or other events that would significantly impair your ability to take the exam). These or any other impairing events will require proof that the actual event had occurred.

DIALOGUES (100 POINTS)

You will be asked to write two dialogues throughout the term (2 – 3 pages each, single-spaced). The dialogue will consist of two or more characters from various readings arguing against one another. More information about this assignment will be given in class.

TERM PAPER (300 POINTS)

You are required to write one term paper (8+ pages in length) that critically analyzes a specific theme in the course. This is a persuasive paper (you must persuade the reader to accept your thesis). You will be graded primarily on content and insight. Well written papers contain a comprehensive literature review, critical analysis and critical insight.

Requirements

1. Your paper topic must be pre-approved, otherwise you will not receive credit.
2. Your term paper must be your original work. Proper citation must be provided to give credit to any works that is not yours.
3. Recycling or re-using term papers from other courses is not permissible.
4. You must provide an in-depth discussion from 3 peer-reviewed journal articles and 2 books.
5. You must provide a thesis and arguments to support your thesis.
6. You must incorporate various authors from our course.
7. The length of the paper is 8 pages minimum (double spaced, Times New Roman, font size 12). Anything else will lead to a grade penalty.
8. Include a cover page (title, name, class, e-mail, phone number)
9. Attach a copy of the first page of each journal article to the end of your term paper.
10. Use MLA style footnotes to cite your sources.
